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5	CHAIRMAN DO: Good morning. Welcome to the
6	meeting of the Orange County Board of Supervisors for
7	today November 2nd, 2021.
8	So now we move to Public Hearing Number 23.
9	Please go ahead and read the item.
10	CLERK OF THE BOARD: Under County Executive
11	Office, public hearing to consider input on proposed
12	2021 redistricting maps and direct staff to make
13	modification to maps as needed.
14	And, Mr. Chairman, we have received 52 requests
15	to speak on this item. And County Counsel has three
16	comments to read into the record.
17	CHAIRMAN DO: Okay. So 53, plus three e-mails.
18	Okay.
19	All right. So go ahead and call I will open
20	the public hearing at this time. Please call on
21	speakers at this time.
22	CLERK OF THE BOARD: First three speakers are
23	Carol G, CL, and Yesen Young.
24	CHAIRMAN DO: Go ahead.
25	CAROL GARRISON: Hi.

CHAIRMAN DO: Good morning.

CAROL GARRISON: Good morning. Um, my name is
Carol Garrison. I'm a resident of Orange, California
and first of all, I want to commend you on your
pledge of allegiance and your morning prayer. It was
really, really wonderful to hear.

Thank you for allowing me to come to speak to you today. I've already sent an e-mail to you but I just wanted to state what my feelings.

I've been in the real estate industry for over 40 years representing buyers and sellers in all of north Orange County as well as some of the coastal areas.

Over the years the clientele has become more and more diverse as we are representing more of the Asian community as well as Hispanics.

I certainly understand with all the movement of people in and out of Orange County the necessity to look at redistricting.

However, it becomes a little tricky as to how to achieve a balanced district. It is important not to create districts that are a particular benefit to one person or another and in an attempt to achieve something politically.

It needs to be bipartisan and for the benefit for all of us who live in Orange County and not just a

few.

After scrutinizing the different options, I just want to let you know that my choice would be for the proposal of Map 2 as it appears to represent everyone in the best way possible.

It is so important to be fair and to put all personal feelings or an agenda behind us.

We are in a culture that more and more is demanding fairness. I encourage you to select and support proposal Map 2 for Orange County. Thank you for your time.

CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you.

CL: Good evening -- oh, good morning. Thank you for looking at me today -- well, except for one of you.

Anyway, so I wanted to give the public, um, the criteria that is chosen --

SUPERVISOR FOLEY: I'm sorry, I hate to interrupt, but I just want to clarify for the viewing public is that I'm looking at my screen because I can't see you because my vision doesn't allow me to see because the glare.

CL: Okay. Thank you for that explanation.

SUPERVISOR BARTLETT: Yes.

Cl: Appreciate that. So um, the Board -- the

Board shall adopt supervisor district boundaries using the following criteria as set forth in the following order of priority: number one, to the extent practicable -- practical supervisor or district shall be geographically contiguous. Areas that meet only at the points of adjoining corners are not contiguous. Areas that are separated by water and not connected by a bridge, tunnel, or regular ferry service are not contiguous.

Number 2, to the extent practicable -- practical the geographic integrity of any local neighborhood or local community of interest shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division.

A community of interest is a population that shares common, social, or economic interests that should be included within a single supervisorial district for purposes of its effective and fair representation.

Community -- communities of interest do not include relationships with political party's incumbents or political candidates.

The geographic integrity of a city or census designated place shall be respected in a manner that minimizes its division.

Supervisorial district boundaries should be

easily identifiable and understandable by residents to the extent practicable. Supervisorial districts shall be bounded by natural and artificial barriers by streets or by the boundaries of the county.

Looking at these proposals there's eight of them and it's really -- it takes -- it's very time consuming to look at them, and I know that's our job to do.

Um, a lot of them are -- are separating these -- these districts enormously. District 5, some of them are just completely tearing this district apart putting it in district 3.

We've taken out three cities that are contiguous to each other. We're putting in completely different districts.

I don't understand the rationale behind that.

Community of interest are together districts.

District 5 should be kept by its -- kept together.

I'm not understanding why we want to tear all these districts apart and put them in different districts and now we have different supervisors.

I oppose most of these proposals. The ones that I prefer and I suggest you hopefully you can approve would be number 8 -- 7 or 8 because to me that's the ones that are keeping the districts together.

I also recommend keeping cities together instead of putting them in different areas and portions of this and portions of that. Cities are community of interest and have the same goals and -- and relationships.

So, um, I recommend -- and also I was thinking about campaigning, if district is divided and I have Tustin in my area but I'm in south county, how am I going to campaign in all these areas that now my area is huge?

CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you.

CL: Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DO: Your time is up.

YESEN: Thank you for the opportunity to speak.

My name is Yesen. I am an influencial voice in the

Asian American community. I am here to support

Proposal 2, map for Orange supervisor district 4

which has 40 percent population of Asian Americans

for four reasons: One, this map proposal creates the

strongest API district of any proposal. It unifies

and focuses on our common Asian American concerns and

needs.

Two, it connects OC's growing north -- sorry -- OC growing north western API communities.

Three, it is the strongest configuration to

empower API voices.

And, four, it is legally sound and creates a Latino VRA district as required by law.

This will help the Asian American communities in the next 10 years as these lines are set. Thank you for your attention.

CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you.

JONATHAN PAKE: Good morning members of the Board my name is Jonathan Pake. I was born in Fullerton, live in Brea and am a life-long resident of Orange County.

I serve as the executive director of the Orange County Civic Engagement Table or OCCET, a non-partisan Asian American, Pacific Islander, Latinx labor environmental justice alliance based in Garden Grove that is dedicated to engaging county residents year around to help build an Orange County that serves everyone equitably and with justice.

Given the importance of redistricting OCCET helped establish the People's Redistricting Alliance a coalition of 16 community-based organizations and residents whose goal is to center low income communities of color and working families in both state wide and local redistricting processes.

Since January our alliance has, one, educated

community based organizations and residents about redistricting and the redistricting process.

Two, created a space where partners have identified the communities of interest most important to them.

Three, mobilize partners to participate in California citizens redistricting commission Orange County Board of Supervisor and other public hearings across the county.

And, four, create a congressional state and local legislative redistricting proposals that center underrepresented communities.

The alliance submitted its Orange County Board of Supervisors redistricting proposal on October 15th.

Proposal 5 centers federal Voting Rights Act compliance and communities of interest that reflect the needs of the county's most impacted residents.

Proposal 5 complies with the Federal Voting
Rights Act by creating a required Latinx Section 2
district in and around Santa Ana. It respects
numerous communities of interest including AMEMPSA,
Asian American Housing Cost Burden, Immigrant,
Latinx, limited English proficient, low income, nail
salon workers, Pacific Islanders, environmentally
impacted, uninsured, and other populations.

It follows population quality guidelines by drawing districts whose total populations are five percent above or below the ideal population with an overall percentage spread less than 10 percent.

It respects the integrities of cities. Districts cross city boundaries for only three reasons: To ensure population equality, comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act, and respect the integrity of community interest that cross city lines.

Finally, it draws contiguous and compact supervisorial districts. We ask that you support a map that centers community needs, not partisan politics. We respectfully ask the Board to support Proposal 5. Thank you.

JULIA GOMEZ: Good morning. My name is Julia

Gomez. I am a staff attorney at the ACLU of Southern

California. And I'm here today in support of the

People's Redistricting Map Proposal 5.

Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act prohibits maps that dilute the voting power of cohesive Latinx communities, in particular the act prohibits cracking voters among several districts so that they have no power and any one district.

In 2011 the then Board of supervisor adopted a map that did precisely this. The current map cracks

amongst several districts, the community of interest center in Santa Ana, a community that is made up of large numbers of Latinx voters.

Although the Latinx community now makes up 34 percent of the county's total population and almost a quarter of the citizen voting each population, the community has been unable to elect a candidate of choice in recent years.

Um, in recent years Latinx candidates have tried to run in districts 1 and 3, two districts that currently split the Latinx community and have been unsuccessful.

To avoid this sort of vote dilution the VRA requires under certain circumstances that line drawers create majority/minority districts where the minority community can have a real opportunity to elect candidates of choice.

These circumstances are present in the county.

The Latinx community with its core in Santa Ana is large and compact and it is possible to create a district around them where they constitute over 50 percent of the citizen age population.

Latinx voters in the area are politically cohesive. They share interests and it concerns in common, they tend to support the same candidates and

policies, and they have faced overt and structural discrimination in the areas of health, education, immigration, and policing.

The Board can and must create a Section 2 compliant district with its core in Santa Ana. Like cracking, the Supreme Court and state law also prohibit packing, placing as many Latinx voters into just one district so that they have less political power than their size merit.

The Latinx population is quite large and a properly drawn map will allow the community to have influence in areas of the county other than the Latino majority district.

Proposal 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map does just that by creating an effective Section 2 district without limiting the Latinx -- the influence of Latinx voters in other districts.

And finally, I just want to highlight the fact that state law now prohibits the Board from drawing a map for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party and excludes relationships with parties, incumbents, or political candidates from the communities of interest assessment.

So with what this means is that the Board can't use the VRA district as an excuse to discriminate or

to favor a certain political party.

Um, you must create a map that both creates a VRA district but also does not seek to favor a certain political party or discriminate against a political party. Thank you.

CYNTHIA VALENCIA: Hello, my name is Cynthia

Valencia, I am a resident of Huntington Beach. I

grew up in Orange County specifically in Cypress and

Garden Grove.

I'm also a senior policy advocate with the ACLU of Southern California. And as a civil rights organization our priority is to ensure legally compliant maps that prioritize communities of interest that have been marginalized for too long.

I am here to support Proposal Number 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map. The ACLU supports this map because it respects the county's diverse communities of interest, complies with the legal requirements of the Voting Rights Act and the Fair Maps Act and it corrects the significant legal problems with the current district configuration.

Growing up in Orange County I know firsthand how the Latinx community and our interests have long been overlooked by local government.

As a -- um, as -- as community testimony during

this process has shown, the Latinx community is being disenfranchised and their vote is being diluted because of the current district configuration breaking up this community into two districts.

It will not be sufficient for the Board to choose a map that slightly redraws the current lines. As a reminder in 2011 there was an ultimately successful attempt to draw supervisorial lines that ensured full Republican control of the Board of Supervisors with every then supervisor met with the OC Republican chairman.

Additionally, local Republican leaders made statements to local news outlets about their success in maintaining Republican control for all of the Board of Supervisors. All of this is a violation of the Fair Maps Act.

And similar behavior this year would be in violating the Fair Maps Act that was passed in 2018 which makes partisanship in county redistricting illegal.

The Board cannot draw a map for the purpose of favoring or discriminating against a political party.

The Fair Maps Act also excludes relationships with political parties, incumbents, or political candidates in the community of interest assessment.

This all means that the current map which was drawn specifically to entrench Republican control of the Board of Supervisors would violate state law if it was adopted today and the means to which the map came to be would also be unlawful.

This means that the Board cannot draw the Latinx VRA district which is required based off of the Latino that we have in such a way to limit Latinx influence in other districts to favor a political party or to discriminate against a political party.

The PRA map is the product of months of community engagement, includes districts that are equal in size contiguous, compact, respect city lines as much as possible. This is why I urge you to support Proposal Number 5. Thank you.

SONNY WAKNENE: Hello my name is Sonny Waknene and I am the managing attorney and voting rights counsel at the UCLA voting rights project.

Um, yesterday we released a report on the need for Orange County to comply with Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act when drawing supervisorial districts which you were just handed I believe right now.

Compliance with the Voting Rights Act will make it such that Orange County must adopt a map that has

a Latino majority district and one Asian American influence district.

As all jurisdictions in the United States redistrict, Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act requires that that jurisdictions do not adopt redistricting plans that pack racial, ethic, or language minority groups, they do not adopt redistricting plans that fragment or crack racial ethic or language minority groups in a manner that would weaken their ability to elect candidates of choice as required by law and that they do not adopt maps with a knowledge, intent, or have the effect have diluting a minority population's ability to elect candidates of choice.

Under Section 2, if a minority group is sufficiently large geographically and there is a presence of racially polarized voting, then a district that respects the minority group and ensures that the group is able to elect candidates of choice must be drawn.

Orange County has a sufficiently large and geographically compact Latino population and the UCLA voting rights for -- project has conducted analysis and is determined that there's racially polarized voting exhibited in county elections.

Utilizing elections that occurred in 2020, 2018, 2016, and 2014 from this analysis it is clear that voters and majority Latino precincts vote in a different manner than precincts with majority non Latino voters.

The diversions in voting between Latinos and non Latinos and/or Anglo voters is particularly important when examining elections for county wide offices.

In county-wide elections non Latino white voters demonstration consistent patterns of voting for different candidates than Latino voters.

This split in which candidates who win a majority of the vote in high density Latino voting precincts but receive low support in high density non Latino precincts is emblematic of racially polarized voting.

Because Orange County -- because Latinos in Orange County, um, have the experience of racially polarized voting it is important that Orange County recognize this and conduct a Section 2 analysis. The UCLA voting rights project has conducted a Section 2 analysis for you which is present in our report which we have published and which has been presented to you.

I would highly consider this report and the RPV contained in it when you are redistricting to

ensure -- to ensure compliance with federal law and that you adopt fair districts. Thank you.

MICHAEL RIOS: Thank you for the opportunity to speak. My name is Michael Rios. I'm with the Voting Rights Project at UCLA. Um, I want to discuss the existence of racially polarized voting in Orange County elections and the reason why it is important to understand the history of racially polarized voting.

So first it's important to discuss what it is and how it comes to be. So racially polarized voting exist when voters of different racial or ethnic group show very different candidate preferences in an election.

So simply put, it means that voters of different groups are voting in opposite directions rather than in a coalition. So now racially polarized voting does not mean that voters are racist. It just means that the outcomes of voting patterns, um, it just measures it, I should say of voting patterns and determines whether the patterns are based on race and ethnicity.

So that being said, the analysis that we have conducted at the UCLA Voting Rights Project and that has been committed to the Board of Supervisors for

review shows that racially polarized voting has been occurring in county supervisor elections as well as other Orange County elections.

More specifically our research shows that Latino voters are voting cohesively and vote together while non Latino voters are voting in opposition of these Latino candidates of choice.

So let me provide a few examples just for the data portion for the record. In the 2020 supervisor first district race the candidate Contreras received approximately 66 percent or two-thirds of the vote in 14 precincts that we estimated as being 80 percent Latino or higher.

Now in 21 precincts that we estimated as 10 percent Latino or lower, so low density, the candidate Contreras only received 35 percent which is essentially losing by the same margin that they won in the high density precincts.

As another example, in the 2016 supervisor first district race the candidate Martinez won by three to one margin in 11 precincts that we estimated as 80 percent and above Latino, yet in precincts that were 10 percent Latino or lower, they did not receive the majority of the vote.

So those are some examples for the data portion

in -- in the report that the UCLA voting rights project submitted to the Board of Supervisors between pages to 12 there are more examples that include scatter plots that give an easy visualization to understand the density of voters in a precinct versus the percent share voter received.

And these elections include both federal, state, and local, um, examples that show this racial polarized voting.

Just to go through some of those examples so that you can keep in mind, we have the 2020 United States representative 39 District. Um, the 2020 state senator 29 District, the actual if you look at the 2020 presidential election you could see that as well as some more local elections like the 201 OC Water Director District, division 1 and even the county treasurer in 2018, the controller in 2018, and we have some elections in 2016 that you could see in the report. Thank you.

KYLER ESOTO: Hello, my name is Kyler Esoto from the City of Orange and I am with Orange County Environmental Justice. We do work in the county around things like soil, led, water quality and other pollution burdens that happen and poison our communities.

And I am here in support of Proposal 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map. First and foremost we support the map because if -- because it keeps communities of interest in south Fullerton and west Anaheim together.

Low income communities -- low income immigrant communities in south Fullerton and west Anaheim share common challenges and environmental justice and access to affordable housing.

Environmental justice concerns are particularly critical to these communities similarly impacted by harmful soil led levels and superfund contamination of the ground water.

Note, that any level of contamination for soil led is bad. But in some cases it exceeds two to five times higher than the state average in west Anaheim and south Fullerton.

And for ground water, any limit, any contamination is bad but it can exceed over 100 times the amount in specific parts of west Anaheim and south Fullerton.

Fullerton, south of Chapman Avenue and west

Anaheim west of the 55 Freeway should be drawn

together in a district and apart from more after

fluent communities in Yorba Linda and the Anaheim

Hills.

Proposal 5 does this while suspecting numerous other communities of interest throughout the county and we also support this map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law and this map, Map 5, is the product of months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact, and respect city lines as much as possible.

Please support Proposal 5. Thank you very much.

RASHAD ALDABAG: Good morning my name is Rashad Aldabag I am a resident of Tustin and I am also the executive director of the Arab American Civic Council which is based in Anaheim's Little Arabia. We're a member of the People's Redistricting Alliance.

I'm here in support of Proposal 5 the People's Redistricting Alliance map. We support the map because it respects the Little Arabia community of interest, keeps it whole, and is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

The map is the product of months of community engagement and follow standards established by the

Fair Maps Act. Please support Proposal 5. Thank you.

CARMEN ALVARADO: Hi my name is Carmen Alvarado. I represent Orange County Congregation Community Organization also known as OCCCO. And OCCCO works to empower, um, and develop grass roots leaders to bring systemic change that results in creating community where everyone can live with dignity and thrive.

Um, we're a member of the People's Redistricting
Alliance, a collision of 16 community based
organizations established to promote a greater
community voice and statewide and local redistricting
processes here in Orange County.

Um, today I stand here before you in support of the Proposal 5 and the People's Redistricting

Alliance map. First, we support this map because it respects our communities of interest in Santa Ana.

Um, as you know, Santa Ana is the home of the largest and most established Latinx community in Orange County. The city includes numerous communities of interest including immigrant, low income populations and ex status families.

And these communities of interest are shared with those in the east Garden Grove including areas of East and West Street between Orangewood Avenue and

Garden Grove Boulevard and east of Newhope Street between west Garden Grove Boulevard and Westminster Boulevard as well as part of west Anaheim.

We ask that you keep Santa Ana whole and together with east Garden Grove and parts of west Anaheim as they are in District 5, in Proposal 5.

Second, we support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act. We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law.

The map is a product of months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact, and respects the city lines as much as possible.

Please support Proposal 5. Thank you so much.

ANNA CHARCO: Um, hello, my name is Anna Charco and I am here on behalf of Latino Health Access.

Latino Health Access have been proudly working alongside community residents for over 27 years providing services that address immediate health needs while providing information and facilitating opportunities to increase civic participation and impact policies that will improve these social determinants in the long term.

I first want to take my time to thank you -thank you for your time, hard work, and dedication to
taking our testimonies into consideration. We are
appreciative of the community's commitment to
acknowledging our input.

I am here in support of Proposal Number 5, the people redistricting alliance map. First we support the map because it respects communities of interest in Santa Ana. Santa Ana is primarily composed of low income Mex -- immigration status Latinx families meaning that their families include undocumented US residents and citizen family members.

They are extremely hard working families with many employed in essential jobs that are unfortunately often overlooked and under paid.

This makes finding affordable housing difficult as more than 80 percent of residents in Santa Ana are tenants the spending majority of the income on rent. Yet they share a very strong sense of community with a large number of community organization and resident led groups that have come together over the years to promote equitable policies and celebrate the Latinx culture through events, activity workshops, and year-round activities that attract residents from all over Orange County.

The city includes numerous communities of interest including immigrants, low income individuals, mixed status families. These communities of interest are shared with east Garden Grove and including areas between Orange Avenue and Garden Grove Boulevard and east of Newhope Street between west, um, Garden Grove Boulevard and Westminster as well as part of west Anaheim.

We ask that you keep Santa Ana whole and together with east Garden Grove and part of west Anaheim as they are in District 5 in Proposal Number 5.

Second we support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act. We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law. This map is a product of months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in the size contingence, impact and respect the city lines as much as possible.

Please support Proposal Number 5. Thank you for your time and have a great day.

CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, the next four speakers have requested a Spanish translator, so their time will be doubled to six minutes.

The first speaker is Alejandra Luciano.

1 ALEJANDRA LUCIANO: Okay. Good morning my name 2 is Alejandra and I am --

CHAIRMAN DO: Can you stand closer to the microphone, sir?

INTERPRETER: Yes. Absolutely.

ALEJANDRA LUCIANO: Yeah. Hi, my name is Alejandra and I'm a resident of Santa Ana for 10 years and my zip code is 92703 and I'm here in support of Proposition Number 5.

Okay. So she's saying, um, we -- we represent the -- on the map of the redistribution of the pueblo district and we support the map because it maintains the integrity of the communities of interest in Santa Ana and it unites similar communities in the east of the Garden Grove and the west of the Anaheim and it fulfills what the federal laws and rights of the voting rights.

So specifically I want to speak about the communities of interest in Santa Ana, um, which are definitely very wholly respected for that Proposition Number 5.

Our communities of interest are, you know, are relevant to related to problems of the community of, you know, living cost of living, immigration, issues our Latin community, communities of low incomes and

communities without health insurance in affect -- affecting our sector.

Okay. It's very important to maintain the integrity of our community because this is going to help to maintain our -- our interest and really assure that we can receive the resources that we really need.

This map is a culmination of months of participation in a community and it will continue the standards already established by the -- the maps, you know, redistricting, the law of redistricting and it will support proposal -- Proposition Number 5.

CLERK OF THE BOARD: The next speaker is Areseli Robles.

ARESELI ROBLES: Okay. So, hi, my name is

Areseli Robles, and I'm a resident of Santa Ana for

20 years and my zip code is 92701 and I work in the

community for 16 years in facilitating the support

group.

So, actually, yeah, I do participate in working in collaboration with the ladies of 60 -- yeah -- yeah, a group of 60 ladies and families united to, you know, to share the importance of the participant -- civic participation and to recognize the citizens

and communities and to know how this affect our communities and families. And we want to really facilitate and be part of the solutions.

Yeah. We want to be part of the solution. We want to appreciate you guys for the consideration.

We're here to, you know, advocate for Proposition

Number 5 presented by the coalition.

So the proposal includes various communities of interest and a community of Santa Ana.

Right. And we want to include the Asian community and we want to speak on the problems of the cost of living. We have problems related to immigration and this definitely affects our communities.

Right. And, yeah, and also we want to really shed light on the fact that we're really struggling with our cost of living, limited English proficiency, you know, low incomes and low access to health insurance and, you know, at the present moment.

Right. Our community is very multi cultural and hard working and immigrants and we're very similar in demographics to west Anaheim and east Garden Grove.

Yeah, we really appreciate your consideration of this petition that is very favorable to our communities and -- and I consider that in this moment

1 indicated that this -- our cities and our -- our 2 communities can receive the same consideration. Thank you very much. 3 So in light of the pandemic we -- we have concerns about our -- our future and possibilities 5 for, you know, we really need -- we need to know the 6 7 consequences after this pandemic. So thanks for your time. CLERK OF THE BOARD: Just get closer to the mike. 10 Okay. 11 CLERK OF THE BOARD: The next speaker is Jorge Casillas. 12 JORGE CASILLAS: Hello, my name is Jorge 13 14 Casillas, and I'm very happy -- oh -- oh, sorry. 15 Yeah. Let me -- allow me to introduce myself my 16 name is Jorge Casillas and I'm a resident of Santa 17 Ana for more than 40 years. 18 My zip code is 92706. Describing, you know, 19 my -- my profile, my work, my background, I'm part of 20 the community located in Santa Ana. 21 First of all, I want to appreciate your time and consideration. So I'm here on the 2nd of November to 22 23 advocate for Proposition Number 5 presented by the

People's Redistricting Alliance.

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1 communities of interest. The plan of the People's 2 Redistricting Alliance will center upon numerous communities of interest including AMENSA, and Asian 3 Americans, communities of problems with cost of living, immigrant communities, the Latin community, 5 communities were limited English proficiency, 6 7 communities of low income, communities of workers of salons such as manicure, communities of the Pacific Islanders, communities with without health insurance 10 and other populations. More specifically I want to 11 talk about our communities of interest in Santa Ana 12 and we're definitely a diverse community. And we're 13 definitely, you know, considering for Proposition 14 Number 5.

My community is very hard working. And we're very conscious of all your obligations of law, and we respect that the norms of the security, public safety for the benefit of others.

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My community is very similar to west Anaheim, and to mention a few, Orange and Tustin as well.

Yeah. So once again, thanks so much for your time to hear my advocacy that I am presenting for Proposition Number 5. Have a wonderful day, everybody, and thanks for your attention.

LAURA PANTOJA: Um, good morning. Yeah. My name

is Laura Pantoja and this is my third time at this meeting and I'm definitely a promoter of my community in this time in reference to Proposition Number 5.

Yeah. Today I work for a community that's diverse and very -- yeah, just very diverse and I'm sorry -- so I work for a diverse population of immigrants, small businesses, and residents and tenants.

And the reason why I'm coming here I want to really advocate for Proposition Number 5 and to community -- and to support advocate for my communities.

So the plan of the redistricting is to support the communities of interest including the Asian American community, the -- our Latinx community and the communities that are struggling with the cost of living, including our bilingual community and communities with very low access to healthcare.

You all as representatives have the opportunity -- yeah, in light of the pandemic that has affected our communities and you guys are witnesses to provide the resources especially to our communities that has been most affected by the pandemic.

I appreciate the opportunity and I hope you guys

really take into consideration and thanks for your time and I hope this -- my words, you know, really have an impact know you guys and your hearts.

CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, we have received 2 additional requests for Spanish translators. The next two speakers are Martha Garcia and Sori Apero.

MARTHA GARCIA: Good morning, my name is Martha Garcia and I'm a resident of Santa Ana for 18 years and my zip code is 92701.

I work as a janitor and I work on the First

Street on Santa Ana Boulevard. First of all, I want
to appreciate for the time to take into -- take into
consideration my time and I'm here in support of

Proposition Number 5.

The Proposition Number 5 is presented boy the People's Redistricting Alliance in this proposition will respect various communities of interest in Santa Ana.

The plan of the People's Redistricting Alliance will center on numerous communities of interest including the Asian American community, Asian American, communities with problems of cost of living and immigration communities including the Latinx community and our communities of limited English

proficiency, communities of low income, and those with less access to health insurance and other populations.

My community is similar to west Anaheim and east Garden Grove. Thanks very much for your time and I hope you guys have a beautiful day -- afternoon.

SARA PERO: Good morning my name is Sara Pero. I am a resident of Santa Ana for 20 years. My zip code is 92701. I am a lead promoter with Latino Health Access. My primary work is for the advocacy of the cost of living. And the area where I live is around Chestnut and Holiday.

I'm here to advocate for Proposal Number 5 presented by the People's Redistricting Alliance.

The proposal of number 5 will represent various communities of interest such as Santa Ana.

The plan of the People's Redistricting Alliance will center on various communities of interest including the Asian American community, the community with problems of cost of living.

Including the immigrant communities and Latin communities, communities with limited English proficiency, communities of low income and those with low access of to health insurance.

So my community is -- consists of immigrants and

1 they're hard working and they're very similar to -and they're very overcrowded. 2 My community is very similar to west Anaheim and 3 east Garden Grove. Overall our communities are very similar. 5 So for today I'm really, you know, imploring for 6 7 you guys to make the right decision and then you guys can approve the Proposal Number 5 which is 8 represented by the People's District alliance. 10 Thanks so much. 11 CLERK OF THE BOARD: Mr. Chairman, all speakers 12 who have requested translators have spoke. So we will reset the timer back to three minutes. 13 14 CHAIRMAN DO: Thank you. 15 CLERK OF THE BOARD: The next speaker is Vincent 16 Tran. 17 Vincent Tran is not present. So next speaker. 18 She's walking up to the podium right now. 19 JANINE ASAR: Hello. And good morning everyone. 20 My name is Janine Asar and I'm with the Arab American 21 Civic Council a grass roots organization that strives 22 to further advance the Arab community in Southern 23 California. 24 We aim to build a community by facilitating the

civic participation of the Arab Americans towards

I am actually here in support of Proposal 5 the People's Redistricting Alliance map. First and foremost we support the map because it respects the Little Arabia community of interest located in west Anaheim on Brookhurst Street.

Little Arabia is home to more than a hundred small immigrant owned businesses serving Orange County's diverse area of Middle Eastern, Muslim, and South Asian communities, including ethnic grocery stores, restaurants, shopping centers, hair salons, Halal butcher shops, and other professional services.

It is home to important religion institutions, non-profit organizations and other social service organizations as well.

All of which serve and support the community and its surrounding areas.

District 4 in Proposal 5 keeps our community whole while the map itself respects a multitude of other important communities of interest throughout the entire county.

Second, we support the map because because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act. The map is the product of months and months community engagement and follows standards established by the

Fair Maps Act including districts equal in size in respects within city lines.

I urge you to support Proposal 5. Thank you for your time.

SHAQUILLE SYAD: Very good morning, um, Board of Supervisors. Thank you for this opportunity to speak to you this morning in reference to item number 23.

My name is Shaquille Syad and I'm here on behalf of South Asian Network, a group based -- thank you, ma'am -- a group based in Cerritos with 50 thousand members.

We had an organization does provide human and health services to South Asian community.

And I am here in support of Proposal 5 the People's Redistricting Alliance map. Um, we support the map because it respects the integrity of of Little Arabia in west Anaheim located in -- on Brookhurst Street between Crescent and Katella Avenue.

Little Arabia is home to more than hundred plus small businesses, serving Orange County's diverse AMENSPA community, and Muslim, Middle Eastern and South Asian community members including ethnic grocery stores, restaurants, cafes, hair salons and various other professional services.

It's also home to important religious institutions across the spectrum, Muslim Hindu, Christian, Jewish community, um, and also non-profit and various social service organizations as well that serve the community.

District 4 in Proposal 5 keeps our community whole while the map as a whole respects numerous other important communities of interest throughout the entire county.

Um, also we support the map because it's compliant with the federal Voting Rights Act. And we understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law.

This map is the product of months of community involvement and engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact and respect city lines as much as possible.

We respectfully ask you to please support Proposal 5. Thank you very much and you have a blessed day.

SUPERVISOR BARTLETT: All right. Thank you next speaker please.

HARUMI: Hi my name is Harumi and I live in the city of Cypress for over 30 years. As an Asian

descent I strongly support proposal number 2 map. It is the best map that represents the growing Asian American and Pacific Islander community in Orange County.

It also connects Orange County northwestern Asian Pacific Islander communities especially in the cities like Garden Grove, Fullerton, Westminster, and Fountain Valley. Such communities of interest deserve local representation to advocate for their needs and values and promote opportunities for them.

This can be best accomplished with the Proposal Map Number 2. It is -- the map is also legally sound and creates a Latino voting act -- Rights Act district as required by law.

I hope the Asian immigrant community of Orange County can look forward to a local government that serves and represents us.

Map Number 2 also keeps Los Alamitos school district intact as the Los Al school district covers three cities, Rossmoor, Seal Beach, and Los Alamitos.

Therefore I implore you to please vote for Proposal Number 2 Map. Thank you for your consideration and for giving us the opportunity to speak.

SUPERVISOR BARTLETT: Thank you, next speaker,

please.

Good morning, Commission Members, thank you give me the chance to talk here and I'm clear.

I'm -- I'm proud to be a residence in Orange County and I have my family here. I raise my kid here. And I love this peaceful community and neighborhood.

And I come here just for, you know, support the Proposal Number 2 and being minority resident in Orange County I think the Proposal Number 2 mostly reflect our benefits and interests and we have a lot of bonding to the Garden Grove, Westminster, and Los Alamitos. We kind of like a big family in the Proposal Number 2.

So I just urge you to adopt Proposal Number 2 and I, you know, wish all your community members and their serve to our community and the people in this county not just, you know, related to any political organization and their political parties. And I think they wish to make a best decision for the people live at this county and they live in their, you know, Proposal Number 2 area.

Thank you so much and give me the chance. Praise God and this is your kingdom. This is your land.

God bless America. Thank you.

SUPERVISOR BARTLETT: Thank you. Next speaker,

please.

BELIN: Hi, my name is Bellin and, um, I am in support of Proposal 2 because it's the best proposal for the diversity of Orange County and it gives the strongest representation of the Asian community.

I am here to represent my friends and to give the strongest support to Proposal 2. My prayers is that you would listen to God and honor the request of the people and do what's best for, we the people.

My prayer is that the power of the Holy Spirit will convict you and not stop convicting you until you yield and do the right thing.

In the powerful name of Jesus Christ, never forget, God's not dead. He is surely alive and I want to thank you so much for allowing me this opportunity to speak. And thank you for taking into consideration our request.

God is alive. And I will be praying for you that God will continue to convict you and that God would save you. In the name of Jesus, God bless you.

VINCENT TRAN: Good morning Board of Supervisors.

My name is Vincent Tran I'm a resident of Fountain

Valley and a part of VietRISE, a non-profit

organization that advances social justice and builds

power with the working class of Vietnamese and

immigrant communities in Orange County.

We build leadership and create systemic change through organizing narrative change and cultural empowerment and civic engagement. We have worked with local residents in the cities of Garden Grove and Westminster throughout 2021 to ensure that our communities are represented and heard within state county and city redistricting efforts.

I'm here to support Proposal 5, the People's
Redistricting Alliance map. We support this map
because it respects Vietnamese American communities
of interest in and around Garden Grove and
Westminster.

Being the largest Vietnamese community outside of Vietnam, Little Saigon encompasses large portions of both cities as well as Fountain Valley north of the 405 Freeway in Garden Grove.

Um, in Garden Grove these communities are primarily located west of West Street between Orangewood Avenue and Garden Grove Boulevard and west of Newhope Street between west Garden Grove Boulevard and Westminster Boulevard.

A large portion, um, of Vietnamese seniors live in mobile home parks in Westminster, Midway City, and Garden Grove which should be kept together within the

same district rather than being separated.

This population is becoming more vulnerable each year with the rising cost of rent and living expenses. They have a long history organizing together to maintain this sustainability of their housing situation and longevity of mobile home parks.

The fracturing of these communities into different districts will further weaken their voices and potentially lead to displacement of low income Vietnamese refugees.

The Vietnamese community in the cities of Westminster, Fountain Valley, and Garden Grove are drawn together in these districts because they share similar immigrant histories, language barriers, or disproportionately low income and share the needs for social services and affordable housing.

They should be kept together to ensure that their share at struggles and concerns of this community are kept together rather than separated.

Second, we support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act. We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law.

This map is a product of months of community

engagement and includes districts that are equal to the size continuous, compact, and respect city lines as much as possible.

Please support, um, Proposal 5. Thank you.

MALANI DEFEFITA: Malo e lelei. Greetings,
everyone. My name is Malani Defefita. I am with
Pacific Islander Help Partnership, a non-profit
organization based in Garden Grove that strives
towards overall health equity and wellness for native
Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders through patient
navigation, community based participatory research,
and programs to reduce health disparities in native
Hawaiian and Pacific Islanders residing in Southern
California.

I am here in support of proposal 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map. We support the map because it respects the native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander community in Garden Grove and our needs.

Of the approximately 20,000 NHPI living in Orange County approximately 1200 are located in Garden Grove.

The city is home to over one dozen NHPI churches, businesses, community-based organizations, healthcare partnerships, youth programs, groups and civic clubs.

Our community experienced some of the highest

COVID-19 cases and death rates of all racial and ethnic groups in the United States. So we advocate for programs that fund our community to combat the pandemic.

We have built strong partnerships with Asian

Americans and other communities in Garden Grove,

Westminster, and Fountain Valley and continue to work

with them on many projects.

Given our shared interest and work Garden Grove,
Westminster, and Fountain Valley should be drawn
together in your maps. These communities are
together in district one of Proposal 5.

We also support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act. We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law.

The map is a product of months and months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, compact, and respect city lines as much as possible.

Please support Proposal 5. Malo aupito. Thank you.

CHRISTINA NGUYEN: Hello, um, my name is

Christina Nguyen and I am a resident of Irvine I am

also with the Orange County Asian Pacific Islander community alliance, OCAPICA. Our organization represents the Costa Mesa and Irvine areas in an effort to address low income youth and their families to our youth force program.

I am here in support of Proposal 5, the people's Redistricting Alliance Map. We support the map because it respects the communities of interest in Irvine and Costa Mesa and keeps the two cities whole and together.

Within the last 10 years the city of Irvine has become one of the fastest growing cities in the state. It boasts flourishing growth in immigrant communities such as Asian American, Pacific Islander and MENSA.

These low income communities have similar needs to the Latinx communities in Costa Mesa. Other than low income, these communities also have needs such as affordable housing and language access within both Irvine and Costa Mesa.

These communities are kept together in whole in district 2 in Proposal 5. We also support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

We understand that a district must be drawn in

and around a Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with the federal law. The map in the in the product -- the map is a product of months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact, and respect city lines as much as possible. Please support Proposal 5. Thank you.

MANNY DELEON: Hello. Good morning. My name is Manny DeLeon and I'm resident of Irvine and I'm with the Orange County Asian Pacific Islander Community Alliance, OCAPICA for short, an organization based in Garden Grove which serves a broader Orange County community including Costa Mesa and Irvine which have similar communities of interest with similar needs.

I am here in support of Proposal 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map. We support the map because it respects our communities of interest in Irvine and Costa Mesa and keeps our two cities whole and together.

Irvine is one of the fastest growing cities in the state and has been fueled by ongoing growth by immigrant communities.

With growing numbers of Asian American, Pacific
Islander, and a means of residence, the city of
Irvine is also home to emerging low-income population

with needs (Inaudible) Latinx community in Costa Mesa.

Recognizing these communities needs related to affordable housing, language access, and other community concerns (Inaudible) assistance and work force development are addressed by public programs in both Irvine and Costa Mesa.

These communities are kept full and together in district 2 in Proposal Number 5. We also support the map because it is compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with federal law.

The map is a product of months and months of community engagement and includes districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact, and respect city lines as much as possible. Please support Proposal 5. Salamad.

NEIL PAVIA: Hello, my name is Neil Pavia. I am a resident of Stanton and I am also the project coordinator for the Orange County Voter Information Project. We're a non-partisan organization that's committed to engaging and educating voters about local and state wide issues and increasing voter

turnout.

And we're here speaking on behalf of the redistricting process today just because it's a way to also promote and limit effective civic engagement in the community.

Today I'm here to support, provide comment on support on Proposal 5, the People's Redistricting Alliance map.

We support the map because it keeps communities of interest in south Fullerton and west Anaheim together. Low income immigrant communities in south Fullerton and west Anaheim share common challenges like environmental justice and access to affordable housing.

Environmental justice concerns are particularly critical to these communities similarly impacted by harmful soil led levels and superfund contamination of their ground water.

Fullerton, south Chapman Avenue, and Anaheim west of the 55 Freeway should be drawn together in a district and apart from more affluent communities and Yorba Linda and the Anaheim Hills.

Proposal 5 does this while suspecting the numerous other communities of interest throughout the county. And we also support the map because it is

compliant with the Federal Voting Rights Act.

We understand that a district must be drawn in and around the Latinx community in Santa Ana to comply with the federal law.

The map is the product of months of community engagement and includes the districts that are equal in size, contiguous, compact, and respect the line as much as possible.

Thank you and please support Proposal 5.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Good morning, Chairman

Andrew Do and Members of the Board, Doug Chaffee, Don

Wagner, Lisa Bartlett, and Supervisor -- Supervisor

Katrina Foley.

First of all, your dedication and continuous commitment to improve Orange County to be a great place to live, work, and raise a family in such a diverse community is much appreciated.

Today I want to voice on the separation of
Fountain Valley and the new Map 2 proposal. On
behalf of Fountain Valley resident and my colleague
and myself, Ted Bui City Council of Fountain Valley,
under the current district split it does not serve
well for the voice of Asian Pacific Islander.

The new Map 2 proposal will create the strongest API district of any proposal. It connects OC growing

north western API. It will give the strongest possible configuration to empower API voice. It is legally sound and create a Latino voting right act district as required by law. Most importantly it will help the Asian community in next 10 years as the line will be set to have one voice.

It will also give our business in Fountain Valley the same opportunity and benefit it will if we were under one district.

Lastly, under Chairman Andrew Do great leadership and his colleague, I want to thank you for your continued support for Fountain Valley.

In July our city received 200 thousand in grant money for business that have been impact by COVID-19.

If the city was under one district instead of being divided as it is currently under, every business owner in Fountain Valley could have benefit from it.

Once again, thank you to all the Board of Supervisor for your great work and hours of dedication for the people of Orange County on behalf of Fountain Valley and my colleague, we want to support the Proposal Map Plan 2 for resident. Thank you.

JOY CHEN: Good morning, supervisors. Thank you

so much for hearing us today. My name is Joy Chen.

I am a resident of Laguna Hills, California. Um, I
actually grew up here in Orange County. Um, I went
to school right down the street in downtown Santa
Ana. Our family owns businesses out in Garden Grove,
California. So this means a lot to me.

Um, this redistricting I think is going to be extremely crucial and pivotal. It's going to change definitely my future my family's future and my community's future. So thank you so much for considering our comments today.

Um, I am here in support of Proposal 2. Um, I do a lot in the Asian community including being one of the members of the Chinese American Cultural Association as well as Asian Industry Business to Business.

One of the things that we do is a lot of outreach and community support for the Pan Asian community.

I think that Proposal 2 is going to keep our community together. It's going to give us one united voice for what is otherwise kind of an underrepresented minority. We really appreciate that. It will also allow for our brothers and sisters in the Latino community to also have a unified voice as well. And that's very important to

our goals as well.

Um, so thank you so much. Please consider Proposal 2. And thank you so much for your time.

MARK ANG: Hi, thank you so much for having me.

Mark Ang. I am president and founder of Asian

Industry Be to Be and also the current president of
the Chinese American Citizens Alliance for Orange

County.

And I wanted to express my support for Proposal

2. You know, I actually put it out to my membership

and I actually got an overwhelming response back

regarding Proposal 2 expressing their joy for, you

know, 40 percent Asian district.

I think it's about time now that we have a district that can unify the Vietnamese and the Korean communities in Westminster, Fountain Valley, Garden Grove, and north wards to Fullerton, west Fullerton and Buena Park and communities west of that.

So I think, you know, that -- that to me was the best map and I thank my membership and I did send -- send you guys on your e-mail the 45 or so people that supported this through our Google forms.

So I'm representing that that voice right now for a district that will advocate for my -- the Asian community specifically creating unity.

I don't believe that we should be breaking it up by Vietnamese or Korean. I think now we're at a stage where a lot of our immigrant communities have now assimilated. There's a lot of inter marriage. So we do have Vietnamese and Koreans that were formally separate disparate communities that are now coming together.

And to me that is the map that makes the most sense because it puts them together as one, and I think the goal in redistricting is to create like communities that can, you know, to make your jobs easier as supervisors representing certain districts that it makes a lot of sense to have, you know, like communities put together.

And I think Proposal 2 does the best job in doing that. So thank you so much for hearing my comments and I appreciate your guys' consideration of Proposal 2. Thank you.

BETTY CHU: Can we start the clock over because I did not -- okay.

My name is Betty Chu, a member of Orange County
District 3 and a member of a team that submitted a
Los Angeles county redistricting map propose that we
prepared over 10 years ago.

My name -- my thanks to Supervisor Don Wagner and

Orange County voters for the defeat of Proposition

16. The race base ballot measure that targeted and discriminated against the Asian communities.

I urge the Board to adopt Proposition 2 because it is the fairest representation of the current and trending geographic demographic percentages here in compliance with the intent and provisions of the Voting Rights Act and has the least deviation of percentages of occ -- of residency.

Most importantly Proposition 2 district fairly reflect the proportion of major diverse, racial, and ethnic per populations geographically unlike other maps being considered tonight.

Proposition 2 contains the largest percentage of contiguous Asian population into District 4.

The Board did not oppose Proposition 16 that targeted and discriminated against the Asians. The elimination of proposition 2 will discriminate against the Asians. Neither dilution nor did deletion of the Asian voices for the next 10 years is in the best interest of Orange County.

Chairman Do states, "I see -- I saw no reason for the large number of Asians to be separated as represented in the other proposals."

Thank you, Chairman Do. And I am sure many other

Asians as well as other Orange County residents are appreciative of your comments.

I urge each of the Board members to do as

Chairman Do is going to vote to avoid all perceptions

of self interest.

And with -- I was going to say that the redistricting plan has the statement in Proposal 2 that it is most focused on equal representation keeping the major communities of interest together.

And I will add and with the least deviation. It is the fairest map that -- and I have reviewed all eight maps.

Thank you so much and thank you for your leadership on this issue, Chairman Do.

CHRISTA JADE: Good afternoon, hi -- sorry -good morning. My name is Christa Jade and I am
living in Dana Point. I'm here to supporting the
redistricting Proposal Number 2, map number 2 because
looking at all the eight maps that was being
proposed, um, it seems that this is the most fair in
drawing the lines according to the communities.

As API as an Asian, I think it's a lot a lot of representation over there and the community is best represented when they are together and not divided.

And we know that this is a kind of, like, you know, a

little bit of hate and things like that, but we all of us we are very -- we studied the map and we see that there is no -- how should I say -- division of certain cities into two within that district.

So Asians communities and other communities will be together for a good reason as they are properly represented, and we appreciate that you will consider Map 2, proposal 2.

And I understand that, Chairman Do, you have speerhead that to agree to that Proposal 2. And we ask that all five of you to look into it and to study it carefully and -- how should I say -- agree on the proposal.

Thank you so much for listening to all of us here. This is short I know I'm used 15 seconds sorry. So this is short. And once again thank you for everything that you all do and appreciate your consideration. Thank you.

GAY DEPARIO: Hello, my name is Gay Depario and I have lived in Orange County for 51 years. But I haven't really gotten involved in civics until very recently when the climate of the politics and what's been happening to this county has been very disconcerting.

I would like to speak on this map proposal. I am

in favor of the new map. The map proposal creates a strongest Asian Pacific Islander district of any proposal.

It connects Orange County's growing northwestern
Asian Pacific Islander communities and it's the
strongest possible configuration to empower Asian
Pacific island voices.

It is legally sound and it creates a district required by law. This will help the Asian community in the next 10 years as these lines will be set. I would like to also say that I am a legal citizen. I emigrated here from the Philippines 51 years ago and I am a naturalized citizen. And I wanted to say that I'm a very proud member of the Orange County. I've lived here. I've worked here. I'm a retired nurse from UCI Medical Center. And I have to say that now that I'm retired, I'm actually civically involved in what's happening in my community, in my cities, in my state, and in the nation.

I urge you to pass this proposal and I would like you to be -- be mindful that we would like to be heard. Our voices need to be heard. You represent the county, you represent the members, and you were elected to -- to listen to the constituents of this county.

And this is a great map to have diversity and have our voices be heard. And I thank you for listening to my comments today. Thank you.

MAY: Good morning, um, my name is May. I'm coming here to represent for (Inaudible) that he was here earlier but he's not able to, um, stay and I will read, um, his letter in here. "Dear the Honorable Board of Supervisor, the subject is support to the super real districting Proposal 2. strongest Asian Pacific Islander district of in proposal unifying and focus our common Asian needs, connects Orange County growing northwestern API communities, especially in cities like Garden Grove, Fullerton, Westminster, and Fountain Valley.

I think it is the strong possible configuration to empower Asian Pacific Islander voices as a whole.

Our -- our voice needs to be heard. Our concerns needs to be addressed.

It is legally sound and create a -- based on Voting Rights Act as required by law to create Asian Pacific Islander district. I support and will tell other Asian Pacific Islander voice groups to support proposition 2 -- I'm sorry -- Proposal 2. Thank you for listening. Thank you for supporting this proposal for district 4 -- oh, I'm sorry supporting Proposal 2 map for Orange Supervisor district 4.

GEORGE LEE: Good morning, Board of Supervisors, my name is George Lee, and I'm a resident of Orange County and I'm former -- the Orange cop president a grass root organization advocating for the civil rights of Asian American community.

I strongly support Proposal 2 for the redistricting because I believe Asian American in

Orange County even though it is increasing, it's -that the population is significant in this county but
the -- the voice of this community is not adequately
represented.

So this map will create a very strong and powerful API district, um, that reflecting the -- the common culture and value and will help this community in the future and give us a platform to voice our community and -- and also this mapping will create Latino VRA district by connecting Latino communities.

So I strongly support for this proposal and I would ask you to consider this proposal. Thank you.

supporting API community.

EDWIN DETURDY: Hi, my name is Edwin Deturdy and I am a founding member of La Casa American which is part of the federation of Philippine chamber of Commerce. And I strongly believe in and support Proposal 2 and hope you will consider it. We need a stronger Asian voice and I believe this district will help unify the Asian voice. Thank you.

IVY ESTRADA: Hello. Hello. I'm Ivy Estrada and I live in Garden Grove, California. We are here to support the proposal 2 maps because out it complies the federal voting rights.

It's also notice -- north Orange County has strong culture and rich sense of community. The growing API community in Orange County deserves stronger representation. It's also -- Proposal 2 also gives the stronger possible representation to Orange County API community. Thank you very much.

ERIC ESTRADA: Good morning my name is Eric

Estrada. I'm from Garden Grove. I support Proposal

2. This map proposed creates the strongest API

district of any proposal. It connects OC growing

northwestern API committee, strongest possible

configuration to empower API voices. It is legally sound and creates a Latino VRA district as required by law.

And lastly this will help the Asian community in the next 10 years as these lines will be set. Thank you very much for your time.

STEPHANIE: Good morning. Thank you Supervisors, Clerk of the BOARD, County Executive Officer, and County Counsel for your time today.

My name is Stephanie. I'm a resident in Newport
Beach I've been an occupational therapist for 25
years, and I've worked with kids with autism my
entire life.

Um, and I've just gotten more and more involved in wanting to, um, be involved in the community of Orange County and make a difference, um, in the county as a whole.

So I'm here in support of proposal 2. Proposal 2 is respectful and representative of Orange County's underserved communities. Santa Ana and central west Anaheim have strong cultural and economic ties that bind the community together.

Proposal 2 gives the Latino community and central
Orange County the voice and representation it
deserves for district 1. Um, Proposal 2 also gives

District 4 the growing Asian Pacific Islanders community a stronger representation.

Living in coastal Orange County, I'm proud that the beach cities have a strong sense of community and I identity. I take a lot of pride in that. I spend a lot of time, um, down and around the beach, um, and care a lot about the cleanliness of the beach and, um, honoring, um, the area that God has given me to live in.

The coastal community should stay together as a strong unified district and Proposal 2 gives a stronger representation than any other of the proposals.

For instance, the oil spill, I, on walks and I noticed everyone down there as a strong community, um, cleaning -- cleaning up and caring so much about the beach cities.

I strongly believe Proposal 2 is the best map and urge the Board of Supervisors to choose Proposal 2.

FIAZ NOABI: Hello, my name is Fiaz Noabi and I serve as the policy and advocacy manager at the council on American Islamic Relations Los Angeles office.

I am also a proud resident of Orange County. I'm

here on behalf of the People's Redistricting Alliance and I want to really thank the efforts of the redistricting commission and the Board of Supervisors for really taking your time to hear the concerns of concerned citizens.

I wanted to comment on the Arab Middle Eastern

Muslim and South Asian community of interest that

crosses -- crosses county lines between Orange and

Los Angeles counties. This AMEMSA community of

interest includes Buena Park, south of the 5 Freeway,

La Palma and Cypress and Orange County and Cerritos

and Artesia and Los Angeles county.

As part of their daily lives AMEMSA communities in Orange County cross into Los Angeles County to shop and ethnic markets, dine in restaurants, worship and access social services in Artesia and Cerritos.

This community of interest should be kept whole in an Orange County based district but was divided in nearly all visualizations as we saw.

We ask that the commission work to correct this.

Across all levels we support the maps we submitted as part of the People's Redistricting Alliance which have been drawn to respect numerous communities of interest including ours.

Once again I want to thank the commission and I

want to thank all the Board of Supervisors to take -for taking in the consideration of our communities.

CURTIS HEBERT: Hello. My name is Curtis Hebert and I am here really as an introductory person for the next person which is my wife. Neither one of us live in Los -- in Orange County but we have many friends who do and we understand that there is a tremendous need for Prop 2 to go -- to go forward. And we believe it's going to be prosperous for the Asian Pacific Island community and so we are very much for that. Thank you very much.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I'm a retired professor at Azusa Pacific University.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, we thank you for seeking inputs in selecting the next district map. I believe that district boundaries must be drawn to best represent our community.

I support Proposal 2 for it create the strongest Asian Pacific Islanders district of any proposal unifying and focusing on our common needs. Common needs while building more proficient more communication and optimizing business opportunities for the success of the community orange County.

Such community needs to have Proposal 2

redistricting map which connects Orange County's growing northern, western, Asian Pacific Islander's communities including Hispanic community especially in cities like Garden Grove, Fullerton, Westminster, and Fountain Valley. To minimize District 4 division our community will highly respect our API demographics of these areas.

I believe that our integrating will increase and produce the best results for prosperity and harmonize lifestyle in Orange County. Thank you so much for listening.

Pat Davis of Anaheim rights, "This is some of the most important work you're doing. How you recognize and apply boundaries to value and uplift communities is essential. Unfortunately your past practices, comments, and behavior towards our diverse community doesn't give me much hope as to how you will approach this with equity and fairness. I would love to be proved wrong."

Felicity Figueroa of Irvine writes, "The People's Redistricting Alliance of Orange County, PRA, is a

multi-racial coalition of a community based organization and residents. They have drawn a redistricting map that centers the lived experiences and priorities, the needs of our most vulnerable communities, those that have been historically marginalized by local government.

This map will empower low income communities and working families, sectors of our population that have been ignored and denied representation for far too long. The OCPRA map has made communities of interest its top priority when drawing lines considering the important testimonies from residents of communities that have been harmed by the current configuration.

For this reason I wholeheartedly support the OC People's Redistricting Alliance supervisorial map.

This map will correct the problems with the current configuration while complying with the legal requirements of the Voting Rights Act and Fair Maps Act.

The current map configuration has disfranchised communities of color by prioritizing the interest of one political party over all the rest.
