#### **SUMMARY:**

First 5 Orange County has been the lead agency for the project management and production of the Annual Report on the Conditions of Children in Orange County since 2015. The report tracks countywide trends that are important for strategic planning and funding decisions. This item requests approval to enter agreements with consultants for three years beginning March 1, 2023.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

First 5 Orange County has a longstanding commitment to the development of the Annual Report on the Conditions of Children in Orange County. In partnership with the Orange County Social Services Agency (SSA) and community stakeholders, we developed the Conditions of Children reports annually from 2015 through 2022. The Report provides an assessment of the status of children through the lenses of healthcare, the economy, education, and public safety. In addition, working with the Board of Supervisors and SSA, we facilitate Community Forums to share report findings and generate discussion and ideas for ways to address needs highlighted in the report.

In January 2023, First 5 OC responded to SSA's Request for Proposals for a contractor to produce the Conditions of Children report for the next three years. In February, we received notification confirming that we were selected to manage and produce the Report. We are requesting authorization to receive \$113,000 per year from SSA to produce the 29<sup>th</sup> – 31<sup>st</sup> annual reports.

Additionally, we are requesting authorization to enter agreements with the report production team (Attachment 2). The team includes an evaluation firm for both project management and content development, and a graphic design firm. In the past, First 5 has provided in-kind or cash support for production of the report. This includes funding the project management of the report as an in-kind contribution as well as direct costs for report printing, community forums and mailing. We recommend continuing this in-kind and cash support. The total cost of the report is estimated to be \$165,500 per year. The first report under this new contract is scheduled for release in fall of 2023.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN & FISCAL SUMMARY:

The recommended actions have been reviewed in relation to the Strategic Plan and are consistent with all goal areas. Funding to support the  $29^{th}-31^{st}$  reports on the Conditions of Children is included in the Fiscal Year 2022-2023 budget within the evaluation funding category and funding will be included in future budgets for the following two years of the report.

#### SUMMARY:

In August of 2020, First 5 Orange County approved receiving \$200,000 from First 5 California and designating \$200,000 in match funds to support home visiting coordination. Staff provided a detailed accounting of the activities that have been supported through this funding at the December 2022 meeting. This agenda item requests approval to enter into a new agreement with First 5 California to continue home visiting coordination for two years.

#### DISCUSSION:

First 5 Orange County, with support from Health Management Associates, is facilitating a countywide collaborative to develop a collective vision and begin the work essential to building and enhancing a coordinated home visiting system. The First 5 Board received a comprehensive update on these activities at the December 2022 meeting and that presentation is included as Attachment 1.

First 5 Orange County was awarded \$200,000 of Home Visiting Coordination funds from First 5 California to begin and support the system coordination work. First 5 California required all recipients to provide a one-to-one match with local funding. That contract ends on June 30, 2023, and First 5 California has issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) to continue this work, due by March 31, 2023.

There are several changes to the administrative structure of this potential funding including no longer requiring a local match. The most significant change is that previously each county submitted and received funding for their county's collaborative work, compared with the new proposal that requires a regional, joint-county approach. The RFP structures the local counties within geographical regions and requires a joint proposal where one county will receive the funding for the region and provide an administrative infrastructure for distribution to the counties. Our region includes Imperial, Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

Given the limited administrative capacity of the other counties in our region, we have volunteered to serve in this backbone function. It will require us to: 1) enter into an agreement with First 5 California for a total amount of \$1,748,005; 2) develop subcontracts with each county and any regional technical assistance providers; and 3) develop invoices to First 5 California, collect supporting documentation from each county, and submit progress reports. We have served in this capacity for the same region in a similar structure for First 5 California's IMPACT funding. As a region and with the support of Health Management Associates, we have begun the process of

developing action plans and budgets for the coming two fiscal years and identified regional technical assistance needs.

Staff recommends the approval of a resolution to enter into an agreement with First 5 California for a two year term starting July 1, 2023 and for a maximum reimbursement of \$1,748,005 as required by the RFP. Once funding announcements have been made, we will return to the Board for approvals of the subcontracts with each county and identified regional technical assistance providers. This additional funding will be critical to support our local home visiting coordination work which continues to gain momentum and support.

#### STRATEGIC PLAN & FISCAL SUMMARY:

The recommended action is consistent with First 5 Orange County's Strategic Plan. The revenue and associated expenditures will be included in our Fiscal Year 2023-2024 and 2024-2025 budget.

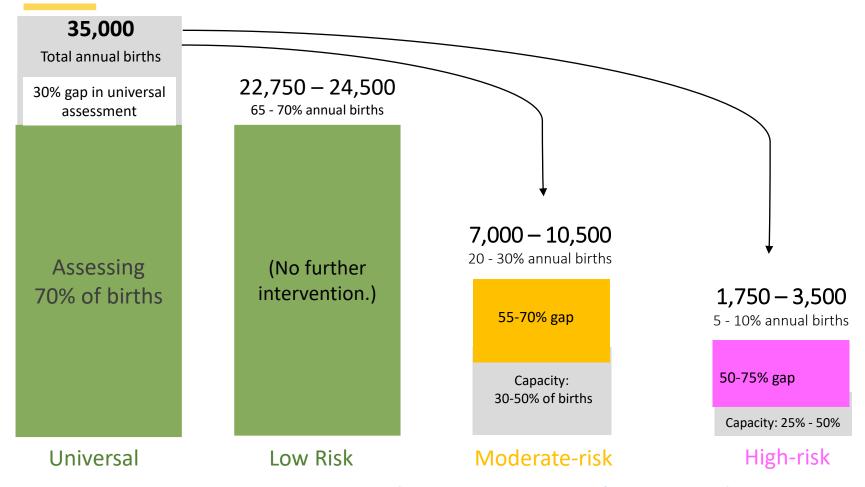

## Key Take Aways

- Current system has insufficient capacity to meet the needs of families with both moderate and higher risk needs
- Significant growth in home visiting funding, administrators, and providers over the last five years has created new capacities to meet OC's diverse family needs AND requires better coordination of these services into a system of care to maximize existing resources and meet family needs
- The COVID-19 pandemic was a significant challenge to maintaining and launching home visiting programs

**WHEREAS**, Commission adopted its Strategic Plan to define how funds authorized under the Act and allocated to the Commission should best be used to meet the critical needs of Orange County's children prenatal to five years of age as codified in the Act; and

**WHEREAS**, Commission desires to enter into an agreement (hereinafter referred to as the "Agreement") with the First 5 California (hereinafter referred to as "Contractor") for home visiting services;

**WHEREAS**, the Commission desires to enter into the Agreement ("Agreement") with Contractor for the terms and in the amounts as specified in the March 1, 2023 staff report for this Agenda Item; and

**WHEREAS**, Commission desires to enter into the Agreement with Contractor in furtherance of the purposes of the Act and the Strategic Plan on the terms and conditions set forth in the Agreement; and

**WHEREAS**, Commission has reviewed the staff report for the March 1, 2023 Commission meeting relating to the scopes of services to be provided and hereby finds and determines that the proposed Agreement is in furtherance of and consistent with the Commission's Strategic Plan; and

**WHEREAS**, Commission desires to authorize the Commission Chair and Commission Clerk to execute the Agreement with the Contractor in the amount and for the terms as specified in the March 1, 2023 staff report for this Agenda Item;

#### NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE CHILDREN AND FAMILIES COMMISSION OF ORANGE COUNTY AS FOLLOWS:

**Section 1** Commission finds and determines the foregoing Recitals are true and correct and are a substantive part of this Resolution.

- <u>Section 2</u> Commission authorizes the President/CEO, or designee, and Commission Counsel to prepare and negotiate the Agreement with the Contractor to in the amounts and for the terms consistent with the March 1, 2023 staff report and scope of services referenced therein.
- <u>Section 3</u> The Agreement will be on the form provided by the Contractor and shall be reviewed and approved by the President/CEO, or designee, and Commission Counsel, or designee. The approval by the President/CEO, or designee, of the Agreement shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of such Agreement by the Commission Chair and delivery thereof to the Commission Clerk.
- **Section 4** Commission hereby approves the Agreement with Contractor in the amounts and for the terms as specified in the March 1, 2023 staff report for this Agenda Item.
- **Section 5** The Commission Chair and the Clerk of the Commission are hereby authorized to execute and attest, respectively, the Agreement on behalf of the Commission.
- Section 6 A copy of the Agreement when executed by the Commission Chair and attested by the Clerk of the Commission shall be appended hereto as a part of Exhibit A to this Resolution. 

### Staff Recommendations

- Start reductions in FY 2023-24
- Use \$4 million of one-time Systems Building funding to offset reductions
- Reduce expenditures by approximately \$7 million over term of Long-Term Financial Plan
- Focus initial reductions on Initiatives less aligned with Strategic Plan goals
- Terminate the HomeAid escrow account and return balance of approximately \$1 million to First 5 OC
